Designers built Nebraska landmarks, brick by brick

Visitors can create their own models at Durham Museum’s new Lego exhibit

Nate Flood doesn’t need digital designs or complicated planning to create one of his Lego masterpieces.

His imagination can take flight with a picture.

“I envision what it’s going to look like,” he said, “and I start building.”

One of his most amazing designs, an intricate replica of Omaha’s Union Station, will return to the Durham Museum as it partners with the Lincoln Omaha Lego User Group on a display that opens Saturday. “Get Building! Bricks at the

Durham” will run through May 3.

US wants China to be included in nuke talks

American, Russian negotiators discuss future nuclear arms control

MOSCOW — Russian and U.S. negotiators discussed the expiration of the last remaining nuclear arms pact between the two countries and agreed on the need to quickly launch new arms control talks, the Kremlin said Friday.

At the same time, the U.S. emphasized the need for China to join a future arms pact and accused Beijing of covert nuclear tests.

The New START treaty expired Thursday, leaving no caps on the two largest atomic arsenals for the first time in more than a half-century and fueling fears of an unconstrained nuclear arms race.

Russian President Vladimir Putin declared his readiness to stick to the treaty’s limits for another year if Washington followed suit.

But U.S. President Donald Trump argued that he wants China to be a part of a new treaty, and his administration ramped up the pressure by accusing Beijing of carrying out nuclear explosive tests.

Beijing rejected the allegations and rebuffed efforts to have it join a nonproliferation deal.

U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio also said China should be involved in a potential new nuclear treaty.

“An arms control arrangement that does not account for China’s buildup, which Russia is supporting, will undoubtedly leave the United States and our allies less safe,” he said.

DACA recipient sues over detention

Omaha immigrant has been held for more than two months without hearing

A DACA recipient living in Omaha is suing federal immigration authorities after being held for more than two months without a bail hearing, the American Civil Liberties Union of Nebraska announced Thursday.

Joel Angel-Becerril, who has lived in the U.S. since age 5, was taken into U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement custody on Dec. 2 and booked into the Sarpy

protects certain immigrants who came to the U.S. as children from deportation and allows them to work legally.

Despite his status, Angel-Becerril has been denied a bail hearing, during which an immigration judge would decide whether he could be released while his case proceeds, ACLU Nebraska said.

He received DACA status in 2015 and was working for an auto salvage company and a cleaning products company before his detention.

Grant Friedman, an ACLU Nebraska staff attorney and the lead attorney on the case, said the federal government argues they can detain Angel-Becerril as part of a broad federal policy that states anyone who entered the country without authorization is subject to mandatory detention — a legal interpretation Friedman said is incorrect and violates the plain text of the Immigration and Nationality Act.
